

- 26% have children
- 82% have prior history with IPV
- 63% earn less than \$2,000 per month
- 25% are worried about their safety
- 29% speak Spanish as primary language
- 16% are referred by law enforcement
- 16% are disabled
- 10% are referred by family/friends
- 6% have no medical insurance
- 16% are male
- 15% live with a substance abuser
- 18% lack immigration status
- 11% are over 60 years old
- 2% have no place to stay tonight

NEW

PROGRAMS

VITUITY TELE CARE

A team of health care providers working together with The Family Justice Center and STAND! to provide free telehealth access to victims of interpersonal violence.

FOCUS CARD

A free and easy to get prepaid visa debit card offered by Community Financial Resources in partnership with US Bank. The Focus Card offers clients a safe and no penalty alternative to banking through their checking and savings accounts.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PROGRAMS

TRAUMA RECOVERY CENTER

English and Spanish therapy sessions for victims of violent crime. The program is open to victims of all ages, each qualifying victim will receive up to 20 sessions with a certified clinician.

JFK COUNSELING SERVICE

Counseling services to victims or witnesses to Interpersonal Violence. Services are available in English to victims over the age of 14.

CHILD COUNSELING PROGRAM

Counseling services to children 6-18 years old who are impacted by family violence or child abuse. Each child in the program is eligible for up to 50 sessions.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

WOMEN INSPIRED TO GROW AND SUCCESS (WINGS)

- ◆ 2 conferences were held with a total of 154 participants
- ◆ 15 clients participated in a 6 week cohort
- ◆ \$54,000 were distributed to 40 clients to support their growth

COMMUNITY BUILDING

FAMILY JUSTICE INSTITUTE

26 total workshops and 2,389 participants

PROJECT CONNECT

11 gatherings held with 138 participants

COMMUNITY CARE COALITION

9 meetings were held, where 30 different agencies presented reaching an audience of 756 participants

API ADVOCACY COALITION

Reached approximately 3,000 residents through a combination of direct community outreach, distribution channels, and direct canvassing. Although this project focused primarily on the API community - we are proud to have turned no one away, and served the multicultural community of various races, ethnicities, ages, genders, socio-economic status, etc.


